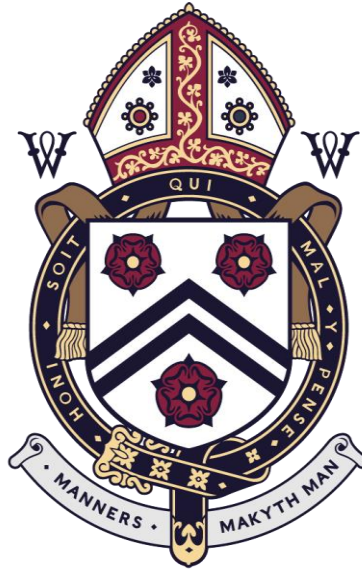

COMPREHENSION

Read this passage carefully, and then, without writing a translation, answer the questions which follow.

Almost 100 years after Julius Caesar's two expeditions, In 43 AD the Romans conquered Britain. However, a revolt soon broke out among various British tribes, led by Caratacus. In 51 AD Caratacus risked everything on one great battle.

ante proelium Caratacus Britannos his verbis hortatus est ut pugnarent: 'hodie aut liberabimur aut servi Romanorum semper erimus. patres nostri Iulium Caesarem ex hac insula pepulerunt. vos quoque fortiter pugnate; nolite Romanos timere. quis servus esse vult? trademusne coniuges nostras liberosque Romanis? aut
5 vincemus aut moriemur.'

Britanni tamen, quamquam fortissime pugnauerunt, exercitum Romanorum superare non poterant. multis militibus occisis, ceteri fugerunt. uxor et filia Carataci captae sunt; fratres eius se in manus ducis Romani dederunt; ipse ad reginam Brigantum, Cartimanduum nomine, fugit, sed ab ea Romanis traditus est.

PROSE COMPOSITION

On **alternate lines** translate the following passage into Latin

Odysseus is trapped in the cave of the Cyclops

Once Odysseus, who had sailed from Troy after the victory of the Greeks, reached Sicily with many companions. After leaving their ship, they found a big cave near the sea. They saw that a man lived in the cave. The sailors wanted to go back to the ship, but Odysseus decided to stay to receive gifts.

5 Soon a huge man approached the cave, leading sheep from the field. He placed a very heavy rock in front of the mouth of the cave; he sat in the middle of the cave; at last he caught sight of Odysseus and the other Greeks.

Suddenly he takes two men. He kills them with his hands and eats them quickly. Great shouts are heard. But because the rock is very big the Greeks
10 are not able to escape.
